2013 BUDGET APPROVED

The 2013 Budget predicts that total General Fund revenue will be \$6,413,000. Major revenue sources are real estate taxes (\$2,468,000) and Earned Income Tax (\$2,958,500). The 2013 Budget proposes General Fund expenditures equal to \$6,836,500. Major expenditures are Public Safety (\$1,719,000), Public Works (\$2,502,100), Refuse Collection (\$781,500) Administration (\$573,500) and Library (\$350,000). The difference between Revenue and Expenditures is offset by a reduction of reserves in the General Fund from \$923,000 to \$560,000. The 2013 Budget may be reviewed in the Borough office during normal business hours or on the Borough's website at www.fox-chapel.pa.us.

Since many homeowners have appealed their 2013 assessments, the real estate tax millage will not be set until at least April so that appeals can be heard. By law, the Borough must set the 2013 millage at a rate that yields the same tax revenue as the Borough received in 2012 known as "equalizing" the millage. Delaying the adoption of a real estate tax rate until April will enable the Borough to better "equalize" the millage. 🐾

PROPERTY OWNERS REQUIRED TO REPORT TENANTS

At its November meeting, Borough Council enacted Ordinance No. 688 requiring owners of real property in the Borough who agree to transfer such property or to permit others to use their property or a portion of it for residential purposes must report those transferees to the Borough. Failure to report tenant information to the Borough can result in a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$300. The form entitled "Rental Unit Registration" can be found on the Borough's website on the Home Page under Forms. The form requires owner information as well as renter information. Once completed, the form must be filed at the Borough office. 🐾

LST (LOCAL SERVICES TAX)

All employees whose primary place of business is located in Fox Chapel Borough must pay a \$52 Local Services Tax for emergency services and road maintenance. Each employer in the Borough, including residents with home occupations, is charged with the duty of deducting the tax from each of his employees and remitting payment to **Keystone Collections Group**, 546 Wendell Road, Irwin, PA 15642 (724/978-0300), forms available at www.keystonecollects.com, within thirty days after the end of each calendar quarter. An employee subject to the tax shall be assessed by the employer a pro rata share of the tax for each payroll period in which the person is working. The pro rata share for a payroll period shall be determined by dividing the \$52 annual tax by the number of payroll periods established by the employer for the calendar year. For example, if payroll is bi-weekly, the rate to be withheld per employee is \$52/26 or \$2 per payroll. Any person whose total earned income and net profits from all sources within the Borough is less than \$12,000 may annually file an exemption certificate with the Borough and with the person's employer. EARNED INCOME TAX (EIT)

Residents are reminded that beginning in 2012, Keystone Collections Group was appointed EIT collector for Fox Chapel. The address is 546 Wendel Road, Irwin, PA 15642, 724/978-0300, www.keystonecollects.com. Keystone will also be collecting delinquent EIT.

BRUSH COLLECTION

The Borough will provide spring brush collection beginning March 11th according to the schedule found in this newsletter. Please inform your landscapers of the collection schedule. Weather conditions or other emergencies could cause delays in the collection.



All brush must be placed at the roadside with the cut end toward the street. No tree limbs larger than five inches in diameter or eight feet in length will be collected. Hedges, vines, rose bushes, shrubs, multi-flora

hedges, etc. must be securely tied in bundles not exceeding 16 inches in diameter. Loose hedges, vines, bushes, etc., will not be collected. No leaves, grass clippings or other debris will be collected as part of the brush program. Please make certain no metal objects are in the branches. Borough personnel are not permitted to enter onto private property for the collection of brush or trimmings. Of necessity, the amount of brush or tree trimmings to be collected from individual properties must be regulated. Accordingly, the volume of material that will be collected by the Borough must be limited to a single pile per property, said pile not to exceed four feet in width by six feet in height by eight feet in length. 🐾

SNOW-COVERED DRIVEWAYS

Unplowed driveways make it dangerous or impossible for the garbage collectors to get to many homes. *It is the homeowner's responsibility to make certain that driveways are plowed and ice/snow free to permit the garbage collectors to access homes.* The garbage collectors cannot be expected to trudge through snow- and ice-covered driveways to collect your garbage and then carry it out to the street. The collectors are authorized to skip any property where the driveway has not been cleared and will not be required to make a return visit before the normal collection date the following week. If a driveway is inaccessible or blocked by vehicles and the garbage needs to be picked up, it will need to be at the curb. 🐾

IMPROVEMENT PERMIT

While planning property improvement projects for the spring, please be aware that driveway modifications require a Driveway Improvement Permit from the Borough before starting any work such as repaving, changing the material, grade or drainage pattern. The Borough would appreciate residents making the contractor aware of the requirement for a permit. The Driveway Permit Application is available at the Borough office or on the Borough's website. FOX CHAPEL (WATER) AUTHORITY

The Fox Chapel Authority is a separate entity from the Borough and is located in RIDC Park. Any questions regarding water pressure, a water break, water safety, etc., should be directed to the Water Authority. Please call the Water Authority at 412/963-0212 with any water questions or concerns.

The Fox Chapel Authority would like to remind residents that it is the Authority's policy that upon transfer in ownership of any property, the property must be brought into compliance with current industry standards that includes the following:

- A final meter reading and inspection must be scheduled by the seller.
- A lien letter should be requested by the closing agent.
- An approved backflow prevention device must be installed immediately after the meter.
- The curb box and curb stop must be accessible (at grade). Approved materials are available from the Authority at cost.
- The meter shall be accessible to Authority personnel for the final reading and maintenance as required.
- If property is served by a meter pit, the pit shall be of sound construction and covered or insulated to prevent meter from freezing. 🐾

DEER STUDY/TRILLIUM TRAIL

Dear Fox Chapel Borough Residents,

In this letter I would like to express my gratitude for your continued encouragement of our research at Trillium Trail. The supportive role that the Fox Chapel community has played in enabling this project is a model for cooperation and collaboration that I hope other scientists and municipalities will emulate. Some history: In 1994 the first deer exclusion paired plots were erected in Trillium Trail, an effort spearheaded by Lisa Smith and Joann Davis. Fox Chapel Borough, West Penn Conservancy and Beechwood Farms funded that plot construction. Based on data collected in those plots, I wrote a proposal to the National Science Foundation to establish more and larger plots in a long-term experiment. In the new plots we investigate the effects of overabundant white-tailed deer on the performances of native trillium, Solomon's seal, False Solomon's Seal and Jack-in-the-pulpit and the exotic invasive plant garlic mustard. Since that first award in 2002, I have secured additional grant funding for this project now totaling \$950,000 that has supported one post-doctoral associate, four graduate students, one lab technician and 60 undergraduate researchers. Every summer since 2002, my lab group has conducted research in Trillium Trail and other beech-maple forests in western PA. Below are highlights of our findings and publications from this research:

- Deer browse an average of 21% of the palatable native species in Trillium Trail annually. If deer browse more than 25% of the Trillium in a population, it will likely decline to extinction.
- When deer are overabundant, even native plant species that deer find unpalatable suffer declines in growth and reproduction similar to palatable plant species that are browsed by deer.
- Garlic mustard's invasion in Trillium Trail is facilitated by deer suppression of the native species through browsing and other non-consumptive effects.
- The soil under the forest canopy of Trillium Trail is inhabited by numerous species of beneficial fungi that form mutualist associations with native herbaceous and woody species.
- Garlic mustard plants produce allelochemicals that kill beneficial fungi in those soil fungi.
- Most of the native herbaceous perennial native plants rely on beneficial soil fungi for water and nutrients. Our experiments show that these allelochemicals from garlic mustard plants cause False Solomon's seal to capture less carbon through photosynthesis and grow less than plants not exposed to garlic mustard because their associated beneficial fungi are lost.
- If this suppression of the native plant growth continues for a prolonged time, then the native herbaceous species will likely decline in numbers in the Trillium Trail understory.
- Good news—Trillium Trail's woody and herbaceous species within the large fenced area appear to be recovering beautifully without the negative effects of deer. 🐾

GARBAGE COLLECTION

The following is the 2013 garbage holiday collection schedule. Garbage will NOT be collected on these days resulting in a 1-day collection delay:

- Memorial Day, Mon., May 27th
- July 4th, Thurs.
- Labor Day, Mon., Sept. 2nd
- Thanksgiving Day, Thurs., Nov. 28th
- Christmas Day, Wed., Dec. 25th
- New Year's Day, Wed., Jan. 1st (2014)

Vogel Disposal reminds residents to please place trash in large garbage bags – not small grocery bags. Also, any bulk item 45 pounds or less can be picked up by Vogel Disposal on your scheduled garbage day eliminating the need to bring it to the rubbish bins. 🐾

RECYCLING ACT (HB 708)

Effective January 24, 2013, Pennsylvania law will make it illegal to place computers, laptops, monitors and televisions in your weekly trash or in the Borough's rubbish bins. HB 708 requires that all electronics now be recycled. Residents can find more information on where to recycle these items at www.dep.state.pa.us, keyword: Electronics Recycling. When available, the Borough will publish information on its website regarding local recycling events. The Borough's garbage collector, Vogel Disposal, is also looking into alternative means of disposal. We will keep residents posted of any news in this regard. 🐾

Residents are reminded that all households in the Borough are required by Pennsylvania law to recycle all of the following materials:

- Glass, food and beverage containers
 - Aluminum and bimetal cans, including:
 - food and beverage containers
 - plus aluminum foil
 - Steel food cans
 - All plastic containers having the international recycling symbol on the bottom, regardless of the number
- Newsprint, magazines, catalogs, phone books, corrugated paper (cardboard) junk mail, etc.
- Recyclables and garbage are picked up the same day. ALL recyclable materials are to be placed in the recycling container provided by the Borough. Newspapers no longer need to be bound or placed in a separate paper bag before placing it in your recycling container. They can be comingled in the recycling bin. Recyclables should be rinsed but the labels are not required to be removed. 🐾



- Field Club Road - Repair leaking sewer in roadway 


